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

- 6.3.1 Curriculum Development
- The college has adopted Credit Based Grading System from 2013 for curriculum reform to meet the challenges pertaining to current trends in higher education to foster global competencies. The same system is being followed in the current year.
  - Curriculum restructuring is a continuous process.
  - While restructuring, feedback from all stakeholders possible are analyzed and appropriate actions are taken for improvement.
  - Consultations with academic and industry experts on curriculum improvement and relevance of programmes is sought to ensure quality education.
  - Multi skill development programmes help in employability. Training through internship, project work, Career Oriented Programmes and participation in various society activities help to develop leadership skill and competence.

- In order to meet the demand for self-financed courses, 6 new staff members were recruited by the management after advertisement and interviews.
- Peons and clerks were also appointed to take care of the increased work load.
